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FASEB COMMENTS ON OIG COMPLIANCE PROGRAM GUIDANCE FOR RECIPIENTS OF PHS RESEARCH AWARDS

Bethesda, MD – In response to the Draft Office of Inspector General Compliance Program Guidance for Recipients of PHS Research Awards, the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology (FASEB) issued comments addressing the most problematic provisions, stating that the guidance may not be necessary, and could prove detrimental. FASEB recommends that the current guidelines in OMB Circulars A-21, A-122, A-133, and A-110 continue to be used. “FASEB is concerned that agency-specific guidance might confuse investigators and institutions and create unnecessary paperwork and effort without concomitant improvements in grants compliance and administration,” said FASEB President Bruce Bistran, M.D., Ph.D. The Federation’s chief concerns are the use of the term “timekeeping” in the time and effort reporting section, a lack of flexibility in allocating charges to award projects, and the proposal that exit interviews include mechanisms to solicit suspected tales of misconduct. Several aspects of the guidance may result “in a waste of funds that could be better spent advancing science and educating students,” Bistran noted.
